This week in Reading - Unit 5 Lesson 25 The New Friend

• High Frequency words:

buy, city , family, myself, party, please, school, seven

- Phonemic awareness substitute vowels sounds, segment syllables
- Phonics focus: Vowel combinations: ou, ow, oi, oy, au, aw
- Writing focus: complete sentences including a subject and predicate, writing questions, kinds of sentences (questions and statements), using capitals and punctuation. We will finish up our poems this week.
- Spelling: Vowel Diphthongs ou, ow how, now, cow, owl, ouch, house, found, out, gown, town, shout, power Challenge words: couch, tower, around, powder, ground, hound, doubt, towel, snowplow, crown, shout, sound

 Library day for first grade is *Wednesday*. Children are encouraged to check out one book they can read on their own (or with a little help) and one book to have read to them. Students can keep the books all week to read and reread!

Decodable readers – We are now emphasizing fluency with the decodable readers. *First grades should be able to read at least 53 WCPM by the end of the school year.* Your child's fluency is tested with a passage they have never seen. Building fluency is accomplished by <u>rereading</u> a leveled book (like a decodable reader) until fluent. Your child benefits more from rereading one of the decodable readers until he/she can read it well than struggling through each one once.

Value

- Vocabulary: after, before, between, compare, estimate, equal to, greater than, less than, ones, regroup, tens The skills include compare and ordering whole numbers to 100, use the symbols <,>,and =, create sets of tens and ones, problem solving
- Fourth quarter goals are counting coins to \$1.00, counting by 2's, 5's 10's and backwards from 0-120. There will also be a stronger emphasis on mastery and fluency of addition and subtraction facts to 12.
